Dear Brothers.

Recently you have received the pre-chapter working document for your reflection on the theme of the upcoming General Chapter next year. I do hope you have taken some time to read through the document and to make your reflection on it. I am sure you will have the opportunity to reflect together as a community on the various items in the working document.

I want to reflect in this issue on the term authenticity. If you look up the thesaurus you will find words related to Authenticity and they may be: genuineness, accuracy, correctness, credibility, dependability, factualness, legitimacy, purity, realness, reliability, trustworthiness, truthfulness, validity, veritableness. These words give us some ideas into what authenticity would mean. We are all invited to live lives that are authentic. It is quite a challenge to be able to be truly authentic. What authenticity would mean for us to be is to be who we are as true persons. Much of our lives we put on masks, and most of the time this is done unconsciously. We need people around us to remind us and to challenge us back into authenticity.

As a religious person we always need to call back or remind ourselves as to who we are as a person. Sometimes the structure of religious life does impede us from being truly who we are. We are created in the likeness and image of God and what is that for each of us. It is often said that "the Habit does not a Nun make." Hiding behind a habit or a socially defined image of a religious does not reveal the authentic person that we are called to be. A truly religious person must be an outcome of our inner journey to be who God has created and called us to be. This require a long and winding journey into our true personhood. From a psychological standpoint, our Ego often times is a great master of illusion. It is said that the fallacy of the Ego is the habit of deceiving without limitation. It requires of us a great deal of self-awareness to catch ourselves doing just the opposite of who we are.

The gospel passage that we are the salt of the earth and light of the world are often quoted as our need for Christian witness. This passage from the gospel of Matthew (5:13-14) reminds us of our need to be authentic. What is salt good for if it is no longer salty and what is the use of lighting a lamp and putting it under a bushel. We need to be who we are called to be, the origin of our being. If the talents and qualities that we are endowed with does not shine forth in genuineness then we are defeating the very purpose for which we exist. Thus the call to authentic living is not because it is nice but it is the fundamental of who are called to be. Let us be Brothers who are authentic in our lives and in our relationships.
